So, what's shaking up fireside chats in homes and porches around the Twin Cities lately? A stove by Wittus, made in upstate New York. Designed by Antonio Citterio in 2006, the Shaker-style wood-burning stove is part of a line of fireplaces and stoves from Niels Wittus's namesake Danish company founded in 1978. Minneapolis-based interior designer Lucy Penfield spotted the slim-fitting, customizable steel stove online after searching for alternatives to a built-in fireplace. "It has presence, but it just floats in the room. It's sculptural, like a piece of art," she says. It has also won multiple design awards. OK, so it looks good. But can it heat a room?
